What do you want for Easter? Easter Sunday is April 9. Holy Week begins a week before on Palm Sunday, April 2 that serves as our final preparation for the joy of Easter. We cannot truly experience the celebration of Easter Sunday unless and until we understand the deep agony that Jesus experienced during Holy Week. Again, I ask. What

do you want for Easter in 2023?

This is not a question about a clothing choice or an Easter egg hunt with the grandchildren. This is not even a question about having the family over for Easter dinner. This question challenges us at a deeper level that began on Ash Wednesday and has continued during these 40 days of Lent. How has our Lenten journey challenged us to examine our faith more deeply?

Walter Brueggemann offers in his Advent devotional A Way Other Than Our Own, "So here is my bid to you for Holy Week. As we walk the walk from Palm Sunday to Easter through the Thursday arrest and the Friday execution and the long Saturday wait in the void, imagine all of us, in the wake of Jesus, changing our minds, renewing our minds, altering our opinions concerning self and neighbor and world. The clue to the new mind of Christ is emptying of our need to control and our anxious passion for security."

How are we changing and renewing our minds or altering our opinions about self and others of late? Following the final meal Jesus celebrated with his disciples, he took a basin of water and one by one washed the disciples' feet. At first, Peter balked at such an act of selfless devotion offered by Jesus. Jesus challenged Peter's resistance, but more significantly, challenged Peter's lack of understanding about what it means to follow Jesus. Jesus needed Peter to change his mind about what it truly means to become a servant.

When Jesus had finished washing the feet of the disciples, he explained, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By that we will all know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another." Love is about service. We love when we serve others.

Every aspect of Holy Week is an example of how much we are truly loved. What do you want for Easter? I hope you will pay attention to your Easter preparation this year for it will truly impact what you experience on Easter Sunday. It is my hope that we will emerge from Easter more confident that we have been called to serve one another in the same way that we have been served.

Session Report March 2023

Session met via Zoom and was informed of the successful completion of the organ repairs.

The branding task group presented a new logo designed by Finlay Henderson, and session approved the new logo which will be used in all our correspondence.

Session has received a few nominations for elders, not as many as we had hoped, and will shortly be meeting with the nominees. Presently we have 11 serving elders for a church family of 118 families.

Session has appointed Dave Garson and David McLean as co-convenors for the Property Committee. Both have served in this capacity ad hoc but have now been session designated.

McKenzie, our interim office administrator, has resigned to take up another position full time and a replacement has been trained in the past week (the name is unknown at the writing of the report).

The perception of the lack of communication again came up, and though frustrating, it was noted that it appears to be more of a technological and motivational divide than lack of availability. Remember, a lot of information you may seek is on our website https://standrewsvictoria.ca/. A lot of posters for upcoming events are routinely placed on our 4 bulletin boards, two in the narthex, one at the Broughton St. entrance and one in the Kirk hall entrance. Of course The Link is our monthly newsletter along with our weekly TWASA e-mailed to everyone and available at the front door. Ask your elder or any of the ushers if you seek any information.

Our interim moderator reported that he has contacted a number of qualified individuals to guide our sessions in the collaborative journey that the sessions of St. Andrew's, Trinity and Knox have pledged to undertake. No date has been set for this meeting, but it is hoped to be held sometime in April.

We received word that Dr. John Allan, a long time minister in this congregation, is in deteriorating health. Prayers are requested for his well being as well as strength for Marjorie Allan, his wife and his family..

The Rev. Geoff Jay, a long time associate minister in this congregation, is facing challenges in caring for his mother at a distance. Prayers for strength to sustain him are also requested.

Mission and Outreach Committee

Thank you to the members and adherents of St. Andrew's who generously donated to Presbyterian World Service and Development (PWS&D) during the month of February. A total of \$985.00 was donated with \$685.00 directed to Pakistan and \$300.00 was donated to Türkiye-Syria.

It has been a month and a half since the devastating earthquake in Türkiye-Syria and folks are facing widespread displacement due to damage to homes and loss of livelihoods. PWS&D is responding through their partners at ACT Alliance. Since the quake, the Middle East Council of Churches (MECC) has offered 232 sites such as churches, mosques, and municipal buildings as shelters in Aleppo. As well as providing shelter with their buildings, MECC is providing mattresses, blankets and hot meals to affected families, and this support is definitely needed. In addition, they are working on obtaining further supplies.

For those impacted by the floods in Pakistan, Community World Service Asia, PWS&D's partner in Asia, has been providing assistance. Cash transfers, with the last one being made in February, have been directed to families most impacted by the flooding.



The long range goal is for retraining and growing crops that are more resistant to climate change.

Your prayers and generosity make a difference to our global sisters and brothers.

Property Committee Report

Session has agreed with the committee's request to appoint Dave Garson and David McLean as coconveners of the Property committee.

The committee reports the completion of the 'pony' wall on the south side of the gym which has been covered with cladding to prevent further deterioration of the front facing.

A new sign has been installed above the door at the Courtney St. entrance so it is more visible from the street. (The old sign, inside the 'new vestibule', was not visible from street.)

The lights in the kitchen have been changed to LED at a cost of \$250.

The committee has installed a programmable timer for the AA coffee machine, which was left on continually and is now set at 8am-2pm Mon -Sat.

Due to vandalism break-in at the laneway gate, new larger steel plates have been purchased and installed to prevent access to the gate door knob.

We are testing LED bulbs for the exit signs to reduce electrical costs.

To prevent further graffiti intrusion via the parkade, more fencing has been installed in collaboration with Rexall and the Parkade in cost sharing.

We are pursuing the parapet earthquake safety program through Heritage Victoria as approved at the AGM. Our architect of record is Charles Kierulf.
