Sunday, December 3 begins our Advent worship for 2023. How fitting that we begin Advent with communion. It is also fitting that the first Advent hymn we will sing will be the beloved favourite, *O come, O come, Emmanuel!* This 1851 masterpiece was gifted to us by John Mason Neale, an Anglican priest, scholar, and hymn writer.

Neale was named after the Puritan cleric and hymn writer John Mason of whom his mother Susanna was a descendant. Neale was quite the musician with special gifts in hymn writing and editing. At the age of 33, Neale became impressed with an ancient hymn from the 12th century, which was the origin of the hymn we know today. It is a translation of a Latin hymn, *Veni, veni, Emmanuel*. The 1861 translation of *O come, O come, Emmanuel* is most prominent in the English-speaking world.

The hymn we sing today was first published in 1916 by Henry Sloane Coffin, president of the Union Theological Seminary, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and one of the most famous ministers in the United States. The final version included only the *O Come, O Come Emmanuel* verse by Neale and Coffin's two "new" verses.

In effect, our singing of this hymn honours the Advent gift to the world over 300 years ago. *O come, O come, Emmanuel* tells the good news that a Saviour is to be expected. It was an ancient story furthered in a hymn from the 1700's, retranslated in 1851 and again in 1916. Each generation "furthered the Advent story". Today our world needs the same news! It is up to us to carry the powerful message that despite what you may have heard, Emmanuel (God with us) will still come to our lives and our world. We can help further the ancient story over the coming weeks. We look forward to Advent worship each Sunday.

Join us over the next four weeks as we sing the songs of Advent and Christmas. Join us also on Mondays during Advent from 1:00-2:30pm at Knox Presbyterian as Knox Sooke, Knox Victoria, Trinity, and St. Andrew's gather to study and sing the hymns and carols of the season.

I am blessed to "further the Christmas message" with you and look forward to the charge that Rev. Henry Sloane Coffin translated in that final verse of this Advent hymn:

O come, Desire of nations, bind All peoples in one heart and mind; Bid envy, strife and quarrels cease; Fill the whole world with heaven's peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel

Mission and Outreach - Update on Afghanistan Presbyterian World Service & Development Webinar, November 2

It has been two years since the fall of Kabul in Afghanistan. Unfortunately during these 2 years, Canada was not able to send humanitarian aid to Afghanistan. On June 23, 2023, Bill C41, received Royal Assent by the Government of Canada, which amended the Criminal Code so that international humanitarian assistance can now reach vulnerable peoples. This passed legislation will allow Canadian organizations to deliver this much needed assistance while maintaining strong antiterrorism laws. This was not an easy task to accomplish and it took the tireless effort of many who came together as a group named Aid for Afghanistan Coalition. The Aid for Afghanistan Coalition included the Canadian Red Cross, World Vision, Islamic Relief Canada, Save the Children, Canadian Foodgrains Bank, Presbyterian Church of Canada, Presbyterian World Service & Development, Oxfam and others. Across Canada, many people championed this cause by writing emails, letters or calling their elected government officials to advocate for humanitarian aid to be able to be sent to Afghanistan. Presbyterian World Service and Development thanks all who helped in this regard.

Current situation and emergency food relief

Presbyterian World Service & Development is working with a local partner in Afghanistan to bring food relief

to families in Afghanistan. 97% of Afghans live below the poverty line. This emergency food relief program will provide 4800 families, who have the greatest need, with \$37.00 a month for a total of 3 months. Challenges remain high as programs for development and education are not allowed in Afghanistan, and women are particularly disadvantaged. In addition, the province of Herat was struck by a 6.3 magnitude earthquake on October 7th affecting 12,000 people. As assessments continue the number of households impacted and casualties is expected to increase.

Three Calls for Action:

- 1. **Pray** Your prayers are needed for the situation in Afghanistan. Pray for the work of PWS&D and their local partners.
- 2. **Act** PWS&D will share upcoming opportunities to advocate for longer term development programming, if/when it can be implemented again.
- 3. **Give** The need for food assistance in Afghanistan remains very high.

Share the Joy of Christmas 2023

As is our custom, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church is sponsoring a Share the Joy of Christmas fundraising campaign. All donations this year will go to cover the cost of Christmas hampers for families, couples and singles in need in the Greater Victoria area. The hampers are put together by the Mustard Seed Food Bank, a local charity in downtown Victoria. Its Food Distribution Centre, through its wholesale buying power, can triple the value of every dollar donated to help end food insecurity in our region. The Mustard Seed hopes to provide 1200 Christmas hampers in 2023 and we encourage St. Andrew's to help in this campaign.

The need has never been greater. The Hunger Count from March 2023 identified the visits to food banks were up again 32% from 2022 (overall 78% from 2019!) With the inflation that we have seen in 2023, there is more pressure on low-income families and individuals than ever.

A Christmas hamper for a family of four is estimated to be valued at roughly \$360, up from approximately \$170 last year! Each of these hampers include ample food (a combination of food from the food bank and a grocery gift card allows clients to pick items to round out their meals with other necessities) in addition to gifts for children. Parents can choose from larger gifts for their younger children, gift cards for teens plus stocking stuffers. Depending on the level of donations and a clear need, parents are provided with essential winter items, like scarves, stockings, and gloves.



Your generosity to Share the Joy will make Christmas miracles happen in the lives of your neighbours in need. This Christmas give hope, comfort and care by contributing as you can.






In the Potter's Hand
