#### Parable of the Pastor

A recent epiphany was shared by someone that I know and trust a great deal. This person indicated their primary goal had shifted to ask more questions and be a better listener. How true! Imagine if we lived into the reality that God's greatest desire for us is in learning that loving our neighbor is best accomplished by asking good questions and then remaining quiet long enough to let them talk. This calling feels even higher when we consider that research shows the average person listens at about 25% efficiency.

Calling the act of listening a miracle may seem difficult, but it literally changes the tenor of a room and the hearts within it. If we are honest, we might admit that we may often find ourselves listening to respond, rather than truly hearing.

In Hallelujah Anyway: Rediscovering Mercy, Anne Lamott recommends that in addition to simply showing up for our friends during hard times, an even bigger gift is avoiding "snappy answers."

In the biblical story of the walk to Emmaus in Luke 24, the two men journey seven miles from Jerusalem, when "Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him." I'm taken by how Jesus, in this scene, seems much more intent on being present and asking questions than immediately solving any mysteries: "'What is this conversation which you are holding with each other as you walk?'" he asked. Though we may find ourselves rushing to the part of the story where Jesus eventually reveals himself, maybe the miracle begins with the way he first slowed down, asked questions, and listened as the men revealed their hearts and fractured hope.

"In the Bible, Jesus is asked 187 questions. He answers (maybe) 8 of them. He asks 307," Maybe faith isn't about certainty, but learning to ask—and sit in the complexity of—good questions.

Ask a good question of someone this week. Truly listen to the answer, and then ask another. You and the other person will be richer as a result. Blessings to each of you.

### Dogs & Their Homeless Guardians

A full day symposium on Thursday, May 25th, at 9am-4.30pm at the University of Victoria.

Join us at this in-person event for a one-day, educational, interactive symposium exploring the well-being of dogs and their homeless guardians. Through a keynote address, expert panel presentations, Q&As, and group breakout sessions, we will endeavour to expand our knowledge and challenge our preconceptions about homelessness and animal guardianship. As a group, we will identify potential changes that might be made in local animal and human services, as well as in municipal policy and practices, to better serve all members of homeless multispecies families. A plant-based lunch and coffee and snacks will be served.

#### Speakers:

- Leslie Irvine, PhD, a professor of Sociology at the University of Colorado Boulder, and author of My Dog Always Eats First: Homeless People and Their Animals, a study of the experiences of homeless animal guardians in five U.S. cities.
- Individuals with lived experience of animal guardianship while homeless.
- Kim Monteith, Manager of Animal Behaviour and Welfare for the B.C. SPCA. Ms. Monteith has been actively involved supporting and advocating for unhoused and marginally housed multispecies families in Vancouver and across Canada.
- Dr. Chloë Roberts, a veterinarian who volunteers with Vets for Pets, a nonprofit veterinary clinic
  offering free veterinary care to the dogs and cats of homeless and low-income animal guardians in
  the Victoria area.
- Dr. Jim Crosby, a former police officer of over 20 years and the former head of animal control in Jacksonville, Florida. Dr. Crosby has extensive canine behavioural training and expertise, holds a PhD in veterinary forensics, and is an internationally recognized authority and court-approved expert on canine attacks and aggression.
