
## The History of Pride in the PCC

For the past several decades, The Presbyterian Church in Canada has studied and discussed questions related to sexuality, particularly questions related to same-sex marriage and the roles of LGBTQI people in ministry. During the 2021 General Assembly, The Presbyterian Church in Canada agreed to make changes to its theology and practice regarding marriage, recognizing that people may define marriage either as a covenant relationship between a man and a woman or as a covenant relationship between two adult people. These decisions provide Presbyterian ministers with liberty of conscience and the freedom to choose to officiate or not officiate at the marriages of same-sex couples. Additionally, the church agreed that LGBTQI people (whether married or single) can be ordained and are welcome to serve as ministers and ruling elders.

In 1994, the church recognized that we are called to be a welcoming, nurturing, loving and supportive community, a true church family, and to repent of homophobia and hypocrisy. In 2017, the church formed a special committee (also known as the Rainbow Communion) to listen to the stories of LGBTQI people and others related to harms done due to homophobia, transphobia, hypocrisy and/or heterosexism to them within and by the church and to share their stories of God's grace experienced by them and Christian ministry. The Rev. Peter Bush, Moderator of the 2017 General Assembly, wrote a letter of repentance to LGBTQI people and reminding the church of God's call to be a community where we welcome one another as Christ has welcomed us.

In 2021, General Assembly adopted the final report and recommendations of the Rainbow Communion, which outline ways for the church to acknowledge harm to LGBTQI people through public confession and apology, as well as necessary policies and programs that will help the church include LGBTQI people more fully in all aspects of ministry. Funding is available to support psychotherapy or counselling for those who have experienced harm done by homophobia, hypocrisy, transphobia and heterosexism in the denomination.

As we head into Pride month, consider what progress 2023 may bring, and how you can contribute to the history of Pride in the Presbyterian Church in Canada.



## A Bathroom for Everyone at St. Andrew's

The renovations of the Kirk Hall washrooms, with many thanks to Ballet Victoria, were completed in October of last year. Since then the renovations have been getting rave reviews from facility users.

You may have used them if you attended a concert in the Kirk Hall this year. Perhaps you've seen the ballet performers using them to get ready for their classes? What you may not have noticed is that one of them is a gender inclusive bathroom!

A gender inclusive bathroom means that anyone can use this bathroom. Next time you're in the Kirk Hall try out one of the spacious, sparkling stalls and see what all the fuss is about!

Gender inclusive bathrooms have many benefits:

Communal bathroom spaces help keep everyone safer, especially women and children!

- Protects trans and non-binary users from physical assault and verbal harassment.
- ☐ Decreased wait times for bathroom facilities for everyone.
- Anyone with 'shy bladder' or 'shy bowel' syndrome can have access to a private stall.
- ☐ Easier and greater access to bathrooms for disabled users.
- Supports easier and greater access to menstrual hygiene care.
- Supports equal parenting by allowing equal access to the diaper stations.
- Any caregiver can accompany and assist any child, senior, or disabled person using the bathroom here.
- ☐ Vandalism is lessened in communal bathroom spaces.
- ☐ More cost effective than gender segregated bathrooms.
