PARABLE OF THE PASTOR

Last week I was blessed to serve on the teaching faculty of a transitional ministry training for Presbyterian, Lutheran, Methodist and Mennonite clergy from a broad spectrum of the United States and even from Canada. I am confident that I learned as much as I was able to teach!

Derek is a transitional minister from Southern California who told us of his challenges. He accepted the role of interim in late 2019 prior to the beginning of COVID. He expected a two-year interim process as the church was ready to move forward after paying off the church mortgage and calling an associate minister.

COVID brought a bitter reality that the church would not fare well during or following the pandemic. Members who were unable to attend worship during COVID have not returned to church-life following COVID. Giving dramatically decreased and the church is facing drastic cuts in staff and programs as a result. The elders are discouraged and have begun to look to blame someone – anyone that the church has not rebounded as expected.


Derek has found strength in maintaining two beliefs and practices in recent months. Those beliefs are; remember that something is always working, and reclaim the best part of the past and carry that forward into the future. How did Derek and his church find strength in these two strange concepts?

Remember that something is always working is difficult to do if all you see around you are shrinking budgets and attendance. There seems to be more that it not working than is working. But, when Derek, his Session and his congregation looked more inquisitively and honestly, they saw new visitors showing up for worship and some presenting themselves for membership. The new associate had connected with nearby university students asking for a Seekers Class for new and struggling believers. Several bequests had been given by grateful families of long-term members which had eased the monthly deficit enough for Session to see beyond the shortages to a more positive view of the immediate future. Finally, Derek was encouraged by many in his congregation that his preaching was finding a home in their hearts and their faith was being strengthened. Derek was led to see the things that were working far outweighed the negativity that had gripped many in the congregation...even himself!

Reclaim the best part of the past and carry that forward into the future was the 2nd belief that Derek and his congregation came to rely upon. With careful consideration, the congregation remembered their past which had included regular social events which brought them together for meals, for small gatherings outside the church building and for mutual projects such as volunteering at the home(s) of their most homebound members. They decided to plan one social event regularly that would begin to rebuild relationships that had began to suffer.

Derek found these new beliefs and practices to be pivotal in reframing minds and hearts. What could similar beliefs do for us at St. Andrew's? Think on these things.


MUSIC NOTES
