A RELENTLESS CYCLE OF CONFLICT

As Palestine and Israel are mired in violence and suffering because of the longstanding absence of justice, prolonged political conflict and disregard for human rights, The Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC) stands in solidarity with all the people of the region, who are enduring the devastating consequences of continued violence and strife. With the church leaders in the area, the PCC condemns all acts that target civilians, regardless of nationality, ethnicity, or faith.

As churches call for an end to violence and military activities threatening Palestinian and Israeli civilians, this year's recipient of the PCC's Cutting Edge of Mission Award, Parents Circle Family Forum (PCFF), expressed its "deepest and heartfelt condemnation of the ongoing violence" in Israel-Palestine. The PCFF writes that the "relentless cycle of conflict has inflicted immeasurable pain and suffering on innocent lives. It is a time of great sorrow, knowing that countless families now bear the burden of emptiness in their hearts and the heavy weight of grief due to the tragic loss of their loved ones."



FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION: WITNESSING A SHATTERED WORLD

On behalf of the Victoria Shoah Project, you are invited to attend the annual remembrance of Kristallnacht (Night of Broken Glass) on Thursday, November 9, 7 p.m. at Congregation Emanu-El, 1461 Blanshard Street. This is organized by a diverse Shoah collective of (Holocaust) descendants, educators and caring individuals whose main focus is to continue finding innovative, informative and inspiring ways to honour. commemorate and educate about the Shoah.

We will be remembering what took place on the evening of November 9, 1938. On this night, Jews were targeted solely for being Jewish, with planned attacks on Jewish-owned businesses, buildings and synagogues in Germany and Austria while authorities did nothing to stop the assault. The name Kristallnacht refers to the pieces of broken glass covering the streets but represents the broken lives forever changed by this tragedy. Kristallnacht was only a hint of greater harm to come. The history of this night reminds us of how quickly lives can be shattered.

Please join us to remember the past and pledge to take action for a better future where we will respect and protect our neighbours, not remain indifferent in the face of any injustice against any person or group and work towards building bridges that lead to unity and shalom (peace).

SOCIAL ACTION SPOTLIGHT

Anti-Black Racism in Canada – ongoing impacts of colonization. Canada's colonial history continues to shape the present, with harmful impacts on the lives today of many marginalized people and groups. One area where a history of colonization and its ongoing effects continue to do harm is through colonialism's ingrained anti-Black racism, fostered through Canada's historical involvement in the trans-Atlantic slave trade and continued through discrimination and systemic racism against Black people in Canada.

Today, systemic anti-Black racism manifests as barriers in employment, housing, education, immigration and health care. Increasing numbers of police-reported hate crimes target Black people. According to Statistics Canada, the 318 incidents in 2020 is a 92% increase over the previous year. We know as well from news reports and statistical analysis that Black people are disproportionately represented in the use of force in encounters with police, including fatalities. The impacts of racism affect even the environment one lives in: Black, Indigenous and other People of Colour are disproportionately at risk of exposure to toxic pollutants and the health conditions they can cause, a phenomenon known as environmental racism.

The lived experiences of injustice and racism adversely affect mental, physical and emotional health, and social and spiritual wellbeing. But it doesn't have to be this way. Discrimination that is built into the pillars of society can be countered by intentionally working to dismantle these harm-causing systems, while prioritizing trauma-informed approaches informed by the lived experiences of racialized people.

What can you do? Learn about the intersection and impacts of colonization and racism. Use the PCC's Racism and Hate in Canada study guide online HERE. Write your MP, encouraging the government to develop a strategy to address environmental racism in Canada. A template is available HERE. Unpack the concept of white superiority and privilege.
